ike mushrooms that appear overnight, "NO on B!" lawn signs are springing up in front of homes all across Irvine. Measure B is developer FivePoint's

unpopular Zone Change Ordinance 17-08 — now on the June 5th ballot. Promoted by multibillion-dollar land developer FivePoint, and approved by the Irvine City Council on a 3-2 vote in October, 2017, the ordinance would replace the planned, State-approved, and construction-ready Veterans Cemetery

in the Great Park with zoning that allows FivePoint to build a massive office and industrial development in the Great Park bringing nearly 10,000 more cars every day to Irvine Boulevard, Sand Canyon, Jeffrey and Culver.

Incensed at what many called a "giveaway of our Great Park," longtime Irvine

> resident Ed Pope, a retired social studies teacher, quickly organized a committee to Save the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park. Pope, himself a U.S. Army veteran, launched a bold referendum campaign against the zone change ordinance, relying on hundreds of volunteers to gather

19,164 Irvine resident signatures — forcing the City Council to put the unpopular Zone Change Ordinance 17-08 on the June 5th ballot for an up-or-down vote of the people.

What began as a grassroots referendum - now known as the "NO on B!" campaign — drew support from Irvine veterans, veterans' families, and thousands of other residents from one end of the City to the other. According to Pope, "Every day, hundreds of Irvine residents were signing our referendum petition in solidarity with veterans. But residents also told us they were signing because they were simply fed up with developer schemes, developer greed, and City Council complicity in the kind of overdevelopment that is ruining Irvine."

"The June 5th vote will be a real test," says Pope. This will be the first time in more than 25 years that Irvine voters will have an opportunity to vote on a specific, massive development scheme in this case, unwanted development that would push veterans and the planned Veterans Cemetery out of the Great Park."

Pope noted that the "NO on B!" campaign is a low-budget operation. "Meanwhile," he says, "we are expecting FivePoint and their developer allies to spend millions in an effort to get a 'yes' vote by overwhelming Irvine voters with misinformation, lies and smears. In fact, they have already begun."

"In the end," Pope said, "we'll be counting on Irvine volunteers and hundreds of small donors to carry the day."



June 5th: NO on B!

Zone Change Ordinance No. 17-08 — adopted by the City Council on a 3-to-2 vote at the behest of developer FivePoint — is now on the June 5th ballot, officially designated as "Measure B."

Developer FivePoint is urging a "Yes on B" vote, claiming Measure B is about building the long-promised State Veterans Cemetery in Irvine. Well, not really. Let's be honest about this: FivePoint ballot Measure B (Zone Change Ordinance No. 17-08) is really about getting Irvine voter approval for their complicated land-swap and development scheme which would: 1) replace the planned and approved Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park; 2) rezone the 125-acre Veterans Cemetery site in the Great Park for massive FivePoint development; and, 3) relocate the Veterans Cemetery to an undesirable site 3 miles away, at the busy, noisy I-5/I-405 freeway interchange, known as the El Toro "Y".

Since hundreds of millions of dollars in quick profits for developer FivePoint are at stake, you can imagine the misinformation and outright lies that FivePoint and their political consultants are willing to tell to get voter approval of Measure B.

Let's look at a couple of whoppers you need to watch out for:

FivePoint Lie # 1. A "yes" vote on Measure B is the only way to get the Veterans Cemetery built.

This is absolutely false. Here is the heartbreaking truth. The Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park would be under construction right now, except for the fact that FivePoint got three members of the

City Council (Wagner, Shea and Fox) to kill the project, even though it had received all necessary approvals from the City, State (CalVet) and U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. In fact, when Mayor Don Wagner and Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox embraced the FivePoint landswap in June, 2017, they rejected a \$30 million State budget grant to begin construction of the Veterans Cemetery at the Great Park site — starting with demolition, site clean-up and site preparation — in accordance with the CalVet approved 333-page Concept Plan and Design.

The truth is that even though nearly a year has been lost because of FivePoint and three City Councilmembers, if voters say "NO on B" on June 5th, construction of the "shovel-ready" Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park, as originally promised, planned and approved, can begin almost immediately.

FivePoint Lie # 2. FivePoint's Measure B involves a "simple swap of land," with no adverse environmental effects for current Irvine residents.

Wrong! This is a big, fat lie that should be

of concern to every Irvine resident! Under developer FivePoint's "simple swap," the planned Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park would be relocated to a 125-acre site next to the I-5/I-405 freeway interchange, where it would presumably be built later. But developer FivePoint would take ownership of the 125-acre Great Park Veterans Cemetery site (next to Irvine Blvd.), along with zoning entitlement to build 812,000 square feet of office and industrial development. This massive development, in turn, would bring with it 10,000 additional cars and trucks every day, making the terrible traffic on Irvine Boulevard, Sand Canyon, Jeffrey and Culver even worse, and causing a spike in localized air pollution.

For years now, Irvine residents have been increasingly angry about City Council landuse decisions that are good for developer FivePoint's bottom line, but are producing out-of-control traffic and a deteriorating quality of life for the rest of us. Finally, for the first time in 25 years, Irvine residents have the chance to say NO by voting NO! NO on B!

Two Steps to Start Building the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park



STEP NO. 1. On June 5th, a majority of Irvine voters must cast NO on B ballots, thereby rejecting Zone Change Ordinance No. 17-08 — the land-swap scheme that would permit developer FivePoint to *replace* the planned Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with massive office and industrial projects.



STEP NO. 2. On June 12th, the Irvine City Manager and staff are directed to *immediately* commence construction of the previously approved Veterans Cemetery *in the Great Park* — beginning with demolition, cleanup, and site preparation — in accordance with the approved 333-page CalVet design and concept plan for the Veterans Cemetery.

Irvine's Amazing Meals on Wheels Program

perating out of the Lakeview Senior Center (LSC) in Woodbridge, the Irvine Meals on Wheels program has been serving Irvine senior residents for over 30 years. The mission of the program is "to assist eligible, homebound senior residents in maintaining their independence by providing nutritious, healthy, great-tasting meals delivered to their homes."



The program is jointly funded by the City of Irvine, the National Charity League (Irvine Chapter), State and federal agencies, and individual and corporate donors. Amazingly, 70,000 meals were delivered last year! All of these were prepared at the remarkable Lakeview Senior Center kitchen — with the help of enthusiastic and passionate volunteers.

Volunteering

I personally started volunteering as a driver with the Meals on Wheels program about 6 months ago and deliver meals two Thursdays per month. I've been blown away by the work that they (and now, "we") do. The City staff and volunteers are well-organized, preparing both hot and cold meals

5 days per week, Monday through Friday, for homebound Irvine seniors.

The extent of Irvine's "hidden" homebound population surprised me because, of course, we rarely see the homebound out shopping, or otherwise out and about. Since I'm a sports coach in my daily job, I never really thought much about homebound seniors. However, the people I deliver to on my route are so warm and incredibly appreciative, it just makes me feel good, knowing how important my deliveries are to them.

Volunteer drivers, like me, come to the LSC at 11am to pick up their meals. Actually, we deliver three meals — a hot lunch from a heated container, a refrigerated dinner, and breakfast for the next morning. The much-appreciated meals are delivered to every neighborhood in Irvine. Each

route is very well organized for the driver, with homes located near each other, minimizing travel time.

Individual drivers deliver the meals to as many as 10 households in about an hour, allowing some time for chatting and socializing, which is such an important part of the Meals on Wheels program.

Training a new volunteer

I was fortunate, recently, to train a new volunteer on one of my runs, Cedric Wasano. Remarkably, the company Cedric works for

— **Fluidmaster** — offers 24 hours per year of *paid* volunteer time that he will be using to deliver meals. The Meals on Wheels program enables businesses with a social conscience, like Fluidmaster, to lift the morale of their own employees while improving our Irvine community.

I am fortunate that my regular job is mostly in the evenings and weekends, so this was a perfect opportunity to volunteer, and I just felt that I had to do this. Cedric felt the same way. As he put it, Irvine's Meals on Wheels program provides an opportunity "to give back."

There are other ways to volunteer, too, from helping out in the kitchen to packing the meals. Volunteers are needed and will likely be surprised at how rewarding and personally satisfying the experience is.



SchoolWatch: Let the Reform Begin!

et's give credit where it is due. The Irvine Unified School District (IUSD) is now on a constructive path to reforming its system for electing School Board members.

Just weeks after being threatened with a major civil rights and voting rights lawsuit, the IUSD Board apparently decided to begin the process


of moving from a system of "at-large" district-wide election of its 5-member Board, to a system of five smaller "single-member" districts or areas.

Under the California Voting Rights Act, cities and local school districts are being required to ensure fair and equal representation — especially for racial and ethnic minority communities, and entire neighborhoods, that have been historically under-represented in "at-large" voting systems.

Having made the decision to move forward with reform — presumably in time for the November, 2018 election — the IUSD Board and administrative staff have scheduled a series of informational community meetings and more formal public hearings to receive community comments prior to the creation of district area maps. The April schedule includes a "Community Information Night" on Monday, April 9th at 6:00pm. at the Irvine High School Theater (4321 Walnut Avenue), followed by a Public Hearing at the IUSD Administration Building (5050 Barranca Parkway) on Wednesday, April 11th at 6:30pm. Of course, interested citizens are encouraged to attend and contribute their ideas and comments.

For what it is worth, I previously suggested that in dividing IUSD into five election districts or areas, a good starting point for drawing the new area maps would be to rely on the current five High School Attendance Areas that are already in place. That's my idea. What's yours?

IUSD High School Attendance Areas for 2017-2018 could be the basis for drawing new election area boundaries.



An ICNV Series On Climate Change

Holding Rep. Mimi Walters Accountable

In June and November, residents within the 45th Congressional District will be deciding whether to entrust Mimi Walters with a third term in the House of Representatives. Walters is facing a tough reelection battle, so in a race where every vote counts, it's important that voters take a serious look at her performance record before casting their ballots.

Because the projected impacts of unchecked global warming are so dire, climate change has become the foremost environmental challenge facing humanity. Worsening storms, droughts and wildfires, catastrophic sea level rise, mass species extinction, disrupted food

supplies and political and social unrest result from our failure to rapidly transition from a fossil fuel economy to one based on renewable energy sources.

Public opinion

The Yale Program on Climate Change Communication tracks public opinion on climate change by Congressional District. It turns out that the residents of California's 45th CD, which includes all of Irvine, hold opinions on climate change that are in step with the nation as a whole: 71 percent in the 45th CD believe climate change is

happening; 74 percent want carbon dioxide regulated as a pollutant; and 72 percent believe future generations will be harmed.

How do these views compare with Rep. Mimi Walters's voting record? In 2015, Walters voted in favor of repealing the rule establishing limits

on carbon dioxide emissions from power plants, as set by the federal Clean Power Plan. Her out-of-step opinion of the Plan is still posted on her website: "Forcing a shift away from traditional energy resources would ultimately stifle the economy for years to come and harm consumers' pocketbooks."

Walters also co-sponsored the Stopping EPA Overreach Act of 2017, signed by President Trump; it declares that current law does not authorize or require the regulation of global warming.

The highly respected **League of Conservation Voters**, produces a yearly "scorecard" for every member of Congress based on their voting record on important environmental legislation. Mimi Walters's lifetime score is an abysmal four percent. For 2017, she scored just three percent, reflecting a single vote favoring environmental protection out of 35 House bills addressing environmental issues.

Separate from her deplorable voting record, Walters did one good deed; she recently joined 34 other House Republicans (and 35 Democrats) in the bipartisan Climate Solutions Caucus, which explores policy solutions to climate change.

Walters's website not encouraging

A perusal of her website is anything but encouraging. None of the subheadings in the Priorities tab address global warming or even environmental protection. Inputting "climate change," "global warming" or "renewable energy" into the search function yields exactly zero hits. Rather, under the subheading Creating Energy Independence, the stress is on *expanding* exploration of energy sources (presumably fossil

fuels) through reduced government regulations.

What is particularly alarming to coastal California residents, is that Walters signed a letter last August to Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke in support of reopening drilling off our shores.

It's also disappointing

that Walters has come out squarely opposed to a 25 cent proposed hike in the federal gasoline tax. Even President Donald Trump has openly endorsed a gas tax hike. The gas tax is the primary source of revenue

for the federal Highway Trust Fund, which pays for needed improvements to the country's highway infrastructure and mass transit. These improvements would significantly reduce fuel consumption and traffic congestion. The federal gas tax has not been raised since 1993, despite inflation, leaving the Fund teetering on insolvency. Yet, Walters recently spent tens of thousands of taxpayer dollars to mail out shiny fliers imploring constituents to return postcards stating their opposition to any gas tax increase.

Accountability

As responsible citizens, we must hold Rep. Mimi Walters accountable for her position on climate change. If Walters is not supporting aggressive steps to transition away from fossil fuels, she is either unaware of the views of the overwhelming majority of her constituents, or she simply doesn't care. Either way, her record is unacceptable.

Community Choice Energy and Its Opportunities

CCE allows cities like Irvine to purchase electricity directly from suppliers, rather than through their investor-owned utility (in Irvine, this is SCE), allowing local control.

Irvine Community Poll on Measure B

e devote our Open Forum/Community Voices pages to yet another report on resident sentiment regarding Measure B on the June 5th ballot. Measure B is the unpopular ballot measure promoted by three members of the City Council (Mayor Donald Wagner and Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox) and developer FivePoint. A "yes" vote on Measure B would replace the long-planned Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with more than 800,000 square feet of office,

commercial, and industrial development, and would relocate the planned Veterans Cemetery 3 miles away — next to the I-5/I-405 interchange, known as the El Toro "Y". 


