Traffic (Mis)Management Study

15 months ago, the City Council initiated a Traffic Management Study to “analyze current traffic congestion” and identify strategies to “improve traffic flow in the City.” The completed study includes a number of unsurprising findings and relatively minor recommendations. But the study does *not* address the elephant in the room — the wildly excessive residential growth and development that has created a true traffic congestion crisis in Irvine.

In matters of government, what do you do when you’ve created a huge problem, but you don’t want to admit it, and you certainly don’t want to do what it takes to fix it? Why, of course, you commission a “study” — the bigger, the better. And you

tell the authors of the study not to come back for a long time.

That’s precisely what has happened in Irvine. In March of 2015, amid a rising tide of anger over growth-induced traffic congestion — which is the result

of pro-developer, fast-growth policies — the Mayor and City Council outsourced the preparation of a "Citywide Traffic Management Study."

The study, prepared by Albert Grover & Associates, was delivered to the Irvine Planning Commission for review in April of 2016, and to the City Council in late June.

While the study generally applauds the City's investments in infrastructure and traffic management, it tiptoes around the question of why traffic in Irvine has gotten so bad.

Former City Councilmember and current Planning Commissioner Mary Ann Gaido spoke

directly to what she called "the central issue." "Look," said Gaido, who is a candidate for Mayor, "it's obvious that the current Mayor and City Council majority are rubber-stamping new residential development at the fastest rate in Irvine's history. Thousands more houses and apartments mean thousands more cars and car trips — and much more traffic congestion." Gaido added, "There is such a thing as too much development, too fast. It's called overdevelopment, and it threatens to unravel 45 years of careful planning in Irvine."

Speaking to the question of remedies, Gaido said we need a "Comprehensive Growth and

Traffic Control Ordinance." She added, "But most of all we need a Mayor and City Councilmembers who have the courage to say NO to FivePoint Communities and other fast-growth developers who have little regard for our City's General Plan and long-range planning principles."

The Traffic Study included recommendations — embraced by Gaido and others — to expand the popular iShuttle system, invest further in synchronized traffic light systems, and improve school bus transportation to deal with the "A.M. crush" at schools.

In the course of conducting the Traffic Study, the consultants surveyed hundreds of Irvine residents. By far the largest percentage — 53% — said the top congestion factor was "residential traffic from increasing population." **ICNV**

Double-Trouble for Shea?

The superstitious adage that "Trouble comes in twos" may hold special meaning for Councilmember Christina Shea. Just as she is launching yet another re-election campaign, Shea finds herself under investigation by two State agencies for misconduct in public office.

FPPC Probe

Earlier this year, it was reported that the State Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) had initiated an investigation to determine if Shea had violated the State's conflict of interest laws. The FPPC probe was triggered by revelations that Shea had pressured City staff for special hurry-up approval of renovation plans and construction permits for Irvine-based KIA Motors, while at the same time she was being paid as much as \$100,000 per year as a KIA Motors consultant.

In recent weeks, Shea claimed that the Irvine City attorney had written an opinion exonerating her. Councilmember Jeff Lalloway challenged Shea's assertion, and successfully pushed for Council release of the City Attorney's opinion. As it turns out, the City Attorney did *not* exonerate Shea; he did not even address the question of whether Shea's conduct was in violation of State law; his memorandum only spoke to issues of Irvine City law, which of course are not the basis for the FPPC probe.

In the course of what was a weeks-long dispute, Shea repeatedly attacked Lalloway during City Council meetings and through social media. Lalloway, in turn, began referring to Shea as "corrupt Christina." There is no indication as to when the FPPC will conclude its investigation of Shea.

State Auditor's Investigation

The second investigation of Shea involves the State Auditor, who has been directed by the State's Joint Legislative Audit Committee to look into allegations of abuse of power and misuse of public funds in connection with the Shea-led "forensic audit" of the Great Park.

In what critics called a "two-year, \$1.5 million political witch hunt masquerading as an audit," Shea failed to find even \$1 in unauthorized spending or \$1 in unaccounted for funds at the Great Park. Instead, taxpayer dollars were used to issue subpoenas, take endless depositions, and target political opponents — most notably, then-Councilmember Larry Agran — in advance of the 2014 election.

Misuse of public funds for political purposes is a serious offense under State law, potentially punishable as a felony. The State Auditor's report is expected later this summer.

Mayoral Campaign Takes Shape

The contours of the campaign ahead for Mayor of Irvine became a lot clearer following the June 7th statewide primary election, and the announcement by termed-out State Assemblyman Don Wagner that he was entering the Mayor's race. Wagner becomes the third to declare his candidacy. Long-time Planning Commissioner and former City Councilmember Mary Ann Gaido announced her candidacy in May, and architect Gang Chen has been planting hundreds of Chen-for-Mayor signs along Irvine streets since March.

Wagner's entry into the Mayor's race followed the June 7th primary, in which current Irvine Mayor Steven Choi finished in the "top two" in his bid for Wagner's open Assembly seat. This means Choi will not seek re-election for Mayor, but will instead be on the ballot for State Assembly this November.

Although they are both Republicans, Wagner and Choi are at odds with each other. Wagner backed one of Choi's opponents in the June primary. And Choi wasted no time in posting a Facebook message, saying "NO" — no endorsement and no support to Wagner for his announced Mayoral bid.

Wagner's bid is apparently backed by Irvine mega-developer FivePoint Communities. FivePoint, which put more than \$500,000 into the 2014 Irvine races to elect a pro-development Council majority, is organizing a slate of candidates. In addition to Wagner for Mayor, FivePoint is expected to be backing Councilmember Christina Shea in her bid for re-election and Planning Commissioner Anthony Kuo. Shea and Kuo have been cheerleaders for FivePoint communities, rubber-stamping approval of thousands of new housing units, wrecking the Irvine General Plan and decades of careful planning, despite warnings that traffic and overcrowding would result.

Even as Wagner was entering the race, the two other active mayoral candidates continued their campaigning. Long-time Irvine Planning Commissioner and former Councilmember Mary Ann Gaido has been in the race since May, saying, "I am running for Mayor to make sure that the people of Irvine, not the big developers, are in charge of our City; and that we recommit ourselves to the highest planning principles." Gaido has been calling for City ordinances placing strong controls on growth and traffic. This is similar to the program she offered in her 2014 run for Mayor, when she came within 954 votes of defeating then-incumbent Mayor Steven Choi.

Gang Chen has continued to stake his campaign on his opposition to locating a State-approved Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery within the Great Park. Gaido, in contrast, strongly supports putting the Veterans Cemetery at the Great Park, saying, "It's the perfect place, and the perfect way, for our City and our citizens to honor veterans and their families in perpetuity."




Impressive in Irvine



Guns and Schools... Revisited


Last December — the third anniversary of the horrific Sandy Hook school shootings — I devoted my School Watch column to report on an important gun control measure that was passed by the State Legislature and signed by the Governor. The law took effect statewide on January 1, 2016. Specifically, the measure strengthened the California Gun-Free School Zone Act by closing a loophole that permitted anyone with a concealed weapons permit — and there are many thousands in Orange County and hundreds here in Irvine — to bring firearms onto school grounds.

As I wrote last December, effective January 1, 2016, "Individuals with concealed weapons permits — just like the rest of us — are no longer permitted to bring firearms onto school grounds. Period."

So, I ask: Why hasn't the Irvine Unified School District changed its signs — posted outside every school — to reflect this important change in State law? Warning people about prohibitions against tobacco products, skateboarding and use of profanity on school grounds is good. But where is the prohibition against guns?



Consumer Beware

Check the Bill. Perhaps you're like me. You've picked up the restaurant tab and just plopped down your credit card without really checking the bill. I did this recently, and it wasn't until it was time to actually sign the credit card slip for our lunch that I thought the bill seemed a bit high. I asked the waiter for a copy of the specific charges, and it included a pork cutlet for \$17. Wrong. We had pasta. The waiter quickly acknowledged the error and had the manager correct the charges. I'm not accusing anyone of padding the bill, but where on earth did the pork cutlet come from?

Hey, lesson learned. So, I decided that I had better keep my eyes open and pay closer attention. Sure enough, the next night I ordered two beers and was charged for three. I brought this to the attention of the bartender. Again, without hesitation I was re-billed for the correct amount.

Check the Gratuity. Did you know that most restaurants automatically add the gratuity

to your bill when the party has more than six people? Yes, 18 percent is typically added to your bill with large parties. My sources and informal surveys suggest that servers often don't volunteer that they have already added the tip. Let me be clear: I agree with the policy of including the tip with large parties, but the server should mention to you that the tip is already included. Or, it should be clearly printed on the menu.

Reservations? Sure, restaurants have plenty of rules about reservations. Some restaurants

won't accept reservations for small parties. One common restaurant approach is to take half reservations and half walk-ins; if it's a popular restaurant, they are saving tables for the walk-in crowd. I like that. Even with a reservation, I strongly recommend that before you get into your car, call the restaurant to confirm and let them know you are on the way. Have special needs? Birthdays, food allergies, kids, or elderly folks? Let the restaurant know in advance. Always keep on time! Let's say you made reservations for 6pm and have 16 guests. Be aware that the restaurant might require that all guests be present before seating you. I know this one is hard to swallow — but often they will only allow 20 minutes to hold your table before giving it away.

Jake's iPhone Tips: Hidden Features Revealed

This is the first of a series of articles on how to get the most out of your iPhone. I have been using iPhones for more than five years and have discovered hundreds of useful features within this marvelous device. These articles will help you discover the hidden power of your iPhone.

PERSONAL KEYBOARD SHORTCUTS

Entering and editing text is the most useful—and often most frustrating—iPhone feature. My favorite method is dictation, but it is not always convenient to talk aloud. So I have to type on the keyboard. I will explore in the next few articles how to ease the burden of typing on the tiny iPhone keyboard — and make it fun. These methods will work in any app where the keyboard appears, such as Mail, Notes, Messages, Contacts, Calendar, Safari, and others.

Here is how to use and create your own customized text replacement shortcuts for words or phrases you often use: Notice that there are three predictive boxes just above the keyboard that suggest words or phrases when you begin

typing a new word. This tip shows you how to customize what suggestion appears in the middle predictive box.




For example when I type *jj*, the middle box displays *Jake Jacobs*. When I tap the space bar, Jake Jacobs is inserted into my text.

If I want to insert *thank you very much*, I type: *tyv*. Or for my email address I merely type: *eml*. Or my mailing address: *addr*. Or my home phone number: *hp*. Create shortcuts for any words,

names, numbers or phrases you use regularly. It's a great time-saver!

Create Your Own Custom Keyboard Shortcuts: Tap the Settings icon on your home screen, then tap *General*, and so on through each screen. Here is the shortcut notation I will be using for this: *Settings* → *General* → *Keyboard* → *Text Replacement*. Tap the + button in the upper right corner, then add a new phrase and assign a shortcut to it. Tap Save in the upper right corner. Tap the + to create each text replacement shortcut. Give it a try. Have fun!

What's a Parent to Do?

In just a few short weeks, 9th grade students will be arriving at Irvine's new, \$300 million, Portola High School. This high-tech school located on the former El Toro Marine Corps airbase has been built on a 40-acre site now known to be contaminated with neurotoxins and carcinogenic petrochemicals such as toluene, benzene and other volatile organic compounds (VOCs) that are especially damaging to the health of young people and pregnant women.

Identifying Toxics Source(s)

Although deemed by Irvine Unified School District's (IUSD's) environmental consultant and officials at the California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) to be at "low" concentrations — and thus "not hazardous" to the health of the school's occupants — testing has been performed in only a relatively few locations, with *no* testing at all under the school buildings. DTSC officials have acknowledged that, over time, concentrations of VOCs underneath buildings can be expected to penetrate through cracks, fissures and utility connections in the school foundation, with vapors intruding into buildings occupied by teachers, staff and students.

Even though large quantities of contaminated soil — over 100 truckloads — were accidentally discovered and removed during several trenching operations, areas on the school site with possibly higher concentrations of toxic contamination have not been identified. Instead, the DTSC went along with the School District's ludicrous explanation that the contamination was caused by Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) recycled water used during agricultural operations. That claim was refuted within 24 hours by IRWD's Water Quality Manager.

Photographic and testimonial evidence indicates that the most likely sources of the site-wide toxic contamination at Portola High School are the operation and maintenance of military aircraft from 1943 well into

the 1960s — and the direct dumping of fuels and solvents onto the ground.

Foolish Errors, Dangerous Risks

How did we get to this dangerous and risky point? In 2011, the School District foolishly signed a conditional school-site purchase agreement without undertaking adequate testing for toxics. Remarkably, the purchase agreement included a hold-harmless clause fully protecting the developer who sold them the property from any claims resulting from soil contamination problems. In 2014, the DTSC approved an IUSD soil-testing program for the site, intended to detect contaminants *only* from agricultural operations, *not* the toxic petrochemicals used in military operations.

public participation, prepared a completely inadequate soil-testing work plan (just 10 test locations). The work plan was presented as a *fait accompli* by IUSD and DTSC officials at a March 22nd IUSD Board meeting. After a public uproar from angry residents, a week later a work plan was presented with 17 sampling locations for sub-surface soil-gas testing of the 40-acre site. Testing began almost immediately afterwards, again without public monitors or any public participants.

Test Results

The results of the testing, which I obtained by means of a California Public Records Act request, showed that every one of the widely separated 17 soil-gas test

not to conduct additional testing, the sources of the site-wide toxic contamination — including areas of higher concentrations of toxics on the school site — remain unknown.

In a further attempt to gain traction with the DTSC Director, Agran sent another letter on June 9th, this time to CalEPA Secretary Matthew Rodriguez, explaining that the orders sent to the IUSD by DTSC Director Lee on his behalf have not been fully implemented. Agran requested the State's urgent intervention — with no response to date.

It is astonishing that the Irvine Unified School District, backed by the State, is taking this monumental health risk when it could have been so easily avoided by the timely and proper testing of the property years ago. It now remains up to the residents of Irvine, especially parents whose children are assigned to attend Portola High School, to decide whether they are willing to subject their children to this kind of risk. It also remains up to them to persuade the IUSD Board to do the right thing. IUSD should begin more extensive testing on the site, including under the buildings, and should also install continuous air-monitoring systems in the school buildings.

wells contained measureable levels of various combinations of toxic VOCs. It's important to note that on a clean school site, there would normally be no detectable VOCs in the soil.

Unfortunately, none of the 17 soil-gas test wells was located under a school building. And since IUSD and DTSC have decided

After false and misleading claims by both IUSD and DTSC that the Portola High School site had been thoroughly tested, I obtained and compiled lab reports for all soil testing performed on the site. **These reports revealed that the 35-acre interior of the site had never been tested for toxic VOCs used in military operations!**

It was a letter written by former Mayor and Councilmember Larry Agran to Governor Jerry Brown in August, 2015, that began a lengthy process ending with a remarkable March 2, 2016 letter from DTSC Director Barbara Lee on behalf of CalEPA Secretary Matthew Rodriguez to the IUSD. This letter actually *overturned* the previously DTSC-approved assessment of the site as having been used only for agricultural purposes. The letter and specific orders required preparation of a work plan — with public and stakeholder participation — for testing the interior of the school site.

IUSD consultants and DTSC subordinate officials ignored the orders and, without the required

It is essential that residents, especially families whose children are assigned to PHS, write to the DTSC Director, with copies to the CalEPA and California Department of Education about their concerns. Also, ask IUSD Superintendent Terry Walker how you can transfer your children to another high school until continuous VOC monitoring systems are installed in the school buildings, or until more complete, independent testing is performed, including under the buildings.

What Do YOU Think? That, basically, is the question we ask with each and every issue of *Irvine Community News & Views* that we publish. We are, after all, a *community* newspaper. We report the news *and* we welcome the views of our readers. That's *YOU!* And that's the purpose of these Open Forum/Community Voices pages — pages 14 and 15.

Last month, we reported on the State's belated testing of the Portola High School site to determine the extent of on-site toxic contamination. The findings were very disturbing. Of the 17 test wells dug, *all 17* revealed combinations of toxic petrochemicals (among them, cancer-causing benzene and benzene derivatives). This limited testing confirmed that the toxic contamination was, in fact, *site-wide* — probably from decades of military aircraft maintenance and operations at the former El Toro Marine Corps airbase, involving the dumping of vast quantities of fuels and solvents into the ground at what is now the Portola High School site. Unfortunately, the testing was too limited to locate the specific sources of highest concentrations of toxics. They may be under the school buildings which, unfortunately, weren't tested. This, of course, poses the possibility of a clear and present danger of toxic intrusion into the new buildings, where teachers, staff and students would be put at risk.


We know of no other school in California that was built and opened under such problematic circumstances, with so many questions about health and safety unanswered.

We simply will not risk the safety of our kids.

One Breath = 12 Trillion Molecules

The recent soil-gas test wells at Portola High School revealed that most of the 40-acre school site is apparently contaminated with benzene and benzene derivatives. This is very bad news. But the IUSD consultant and the DTSC claim that the exposure is at "low" levels, so don't worry. They've got to be kidding. Here are the facts: Benzene is a Volatile Organic Compound or VOC. This means it can (and does) vaporize — and we breathe it. Even in minute airborne quantities, exposure to benzene is dangerous. The World Health Organization says in a paper entitled *Exposure To Benzene: A Major Public Health Concern (2010)*, "No specific guideline value has been developed for air. Benzene is carcinogenic to humans, and no safe level of exposure can be recommended." Benzene causes leukemia and all kinds of serious blood and bone marrow disorders.

Consider this: If you take a normal breath of approximately 0.5 liter of air, even if the benzene level is just 1 part per *billion*, you still are inhaling **12 trillion benzene molecules**. Any first semester high school chemistry student can do the math and verify my calculation. And any biochemistry student can tell you that exposure day after day to even "low" levels of benzene will damage thousands of students, teachers, and staff at Portola High School for decades to come.

For the record, here are my calculations: 0.5 liter = 1.2×10^{22} molecules of air at 25°C. (77°F.) At 1 part per billion, that calculates to 1.2×10^{22} molecules divided by 1,000,000,000 = 1.2×10^{13} or 12 *trillion molecules* of benzene with each breath of air.
