MAYOR & COUNCIL Pope • Woods • McGill

f you were one of the 28,638 Irvine residents who voted "NO" on Measure B last June 5th, then on Nov. 6th you should want to make your "NO on B" vote count. How? By voting for Ed Pope for Mayor and for Jaci Woods and Frank McGill for City Council.

As you'll recall, Measure B was the shameful scheme put together by Mayor Donald Wagner and developer FivePoint to actually *replace* the long-planned and approved Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with massive FivePoint development, bringing an added 10,000 cars and trucks to Irvine streets every day.

You will be rescuing our City from the corrupt relationship Wagner and his Council colleagues have with the City's biggest developers, especially FivePoint. According to City records, since 2016 FivePoint and other developers have spent more than \$3 million—first to elect Wagner in 2016, then to support his Measure B scheme, and now to try to get him re-elected, along with two other FivePointbacked puppets, Anthony Kuo and Carrie O'Malley.

Nov. 6th City Election:

Voters Take Aim at Wagner... in Words

hat can a "word cloud" tell us about the attitudes of Irvine residents toward those elected to govern our City? Irvine Community News & Views recently commissioned a special study, asking Irvine voters for a word or phrase they associate with the job that Donald Wagner is doing as Mayor of Irvine. Except for an occasional reference to public safety or "safe city," the words and phrases associated with Wagner's administration are overwhelmingly negative. They reveal a word cloud that is, in fact, a dark cloud of disapproval that appears to be hanging over Wagner's bid for re-election to a second term as Mayor.

Based on a number of focus groups, interviews and surveys, Irvine residents express disapproval of Wagner that ranges from general "disappointment" to deep anger at the Mayor's failure to control development and the "horrible traffic" that, according to many respondents, is producing a citywide "traffic nightmare."

In addition, with remarkable intensity and consistency, voters decry Wagner's relationship with big developers — especially developer FivePoint. Voters invoke words like "corrupt" and "puppet"

and "bought" to describe Wagner's acceptance of millions of dollars in political campaign support from developers, while voting for their massive, traffic-inducing development projects.

Wagner's 2016 Campaign for Mayor

Wagner, a former State Assemblyman, was recruited by major developers in 2016 to run for Mayor of Irvine. Apparently providing whatever money was needed to win, developers funded a vicious smear campaign against Wagner's opponent, former Councilmember Mary Ann Gaido, a longtime advocate for putting strong City controls on growth, development and traffic.

Campaign finance reports have revealed that more than \$1 million was spent by developer FivePoint and other developers and special interests to elect Wagner. They funneled their unprecedented funding through a network of out-of- town political action committees specializing in "dark money" expenditures and political "hit pieces." They savaged Gaido with scurrilous TV ads and with an avalanche of attack mail. In the end, Wagner's developer-funded, million-dollar campaign narrowly edged out Gaido, who had managed to raise about \$100,000 in small donations, in accordance with the City's prescribed campaign contribution limits.

Once elected, Wagner was dedicated to advancing his benefactors' pro-developer agenda — which centered on accelerated housing and apartment development, in disregard of traditional Irvine planning standards. The resulting explosion of traffic has overwhelmed the City's infrastructure, causing dysfunctional intersections and daily commutes that are now described by voters as a "traffic disaster" and a citywide "traffic crisis."

The Measure B Development Scheme

Also associated with Wagner is Measure B, the massive development scheme that the Mayor and big developer FivePoint had to put on the ballot last June as a result of a successful citizen signature-gathering Referendum. Measure B was a complicated land-swap and development scheme to replace the long-planned, State-approved

Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with 812,000 square feet of office, industrial and apartment development, bringing nearly 10,000 added cars and trucks to Irvine streets every day.

With Wagner at the forefront, backed by yet another FivePointfunded \$1 million campaign, the Wagner-FivePoint Measure B was nevertheless rejected by voters in a stunning 63%

to 37% upset. The "NO on B" voter revolt provided a clear, two-part voter mandate: <u>first</u>, it was a rejection of yet another massive development scheme, this time on City-owned parkland that had been reserved for a Veterans Cemetery. And, <u>second</u>, it was a mandate to have the Mayor and City Council immediately commence construction of the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park, as originally planned.

At a tumultuous July 10th City Council meeting, Mayor Wagner — joined by Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox — ignored the will of the people and refused to order construction of the Veterans Cemetery. This has apparently earned Wagner a host of derisive words and phrases packed into his word cloud: "arrogant," "disrespectful," and "anti-Veteran."

It has earned him something else, too. **Ed Pope**, who chaired the NO on B campaign, is challenging Wagner in the November 6th election. And Pope has two running mates who were also leaders in the NO on B campaign, **Jaci Woods** and **Frank McGill**. Woods and McGill are running for the two open City Council seats.

Two Teams. Two Visions. Which Side Are You On?

ere is what's at stake in our November 6th City election. We can elect a new Mayor and City Council majority — Ed Pope for Mayor and Jaci Woods and Frank McGill for City Council. These three

will redeem our historic, June 5th "NO on B" victory — and *immediately* begin building the Veterans Cemetery at its planned and approved original site in the Great Park.

Or, voters can make the mistake of electing Donald Wagner and his "YES on B" team — Wagner for Mayor and Anthony Kuo and Carrie O'Malley for City Council. These three will continue to do the bidding of developer FivePoint, coming up with more schemes and delays and giveaways to allow FivePoint to replace our planned Great Park Veterans Cemetery with massive development.

From 1995 to 2005, the City of Irvine—all of us together—spent more than \$30 million fighting the County Supervisors and developers who wanted to put an international airport at the former El Toro airbase. I know—I was there in the

forefront of that fight. In the end, we won, and we secured 1,300 acres to begin building our Great Park, now under construction.

Then, in 2014, we had the good sense to set aside 125 acres of our Great Park for a Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery, which quickly gained state and federal approval. We were ready to start construction

in 2017, when newly elected Mayor Donald

Wagner pulled the plug on the entire Veterans Cemetery project, at the behest of developer FivePoint. Their outrageous scheme was to replace the Veterans Cemetery with massive development that would bring 10,000 added cars and trucks to Irvine streets, every day.

This past June 5th, Irvine voters finally said, "Enough is enough!" FivePoint's land development scheme — ballot Measure B — was rejected overwhelmingly, 63% to 37%. Thanks to the leadership of Ed Pope, Jaci Woods, and Frank McGill and the 28,638 Irvine residents who voted "NO on B," developer FivePoint — after spending \$1 million in a failed effort to buy the election — was defeated.

But now FivePoint is at it again. They

are spending yet *another* million dollars, this time to elect their YES on B Team. So, which side are <u>YOU</u> on? VOTE!





his election cycle, a total of 16 candidates are seeking public office in the Nov. 6th City of Irvine election. There are four candidates for Mayor and 12 candidates for two open City Council seats. Most of the candidates running appear to be people of good character who are sincerely committed to public service. Judging by the way they are conducting and financing their campaigns, however, a few have made it clear that they are more interested in serving their own political interests by serving powerful special interests — especially the developers who are funding their campaigns.

Let's get specific. One of Irvine's big developers, FivePoint, has been pouring millions of dollars into Irvine elections in recent years: FivePoint spent more than a million dollars to elect Donald Wagner as Mayor in 2016; FivePoint spent another million dollars backing the Wagner-FivePoint June 5th ballot scheme (Measure B) to replace the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with massive development. And now, FivePoint is spending *yet another million dollars* to re-elect Wagner and elect Anthony Kuo and Carrie O'Malley to the two open City Council seats.

Wagner, Kuo and O'Malley are now running as a team — and all three are getting huge help from developer FivePoint. You've probably

seen much of it in your mailbox and on TV — big, expensive, slick mailers and fancy TV ads costing more than \$100,000 per week.

Instead of candidates paying for all this themselves — through their own campaign committees and donors — most of the slick mailers and TV ads are paid for by any number of out-of-town political action committees and so-called "independent expenditure committees" that are FivePoint's favorite conduits for many hundreds of thousands of dollars.

In a sense, Wagner, Kuo and O'Malley have outsourced their entire campaigns to developer FivePoint. And FivePoint, in turn, knows they can count on Wagner, Kuo and O'Malley to say "yes, yes, yes" to FivePoint — giving them whatever approvals they ask for. That's exactly what Anthony Kuo has been doing for years as a City Planning Commissioner. And it's what Carrie O'Malley has been doing as a City Transportation Commissioner as well.

With this kind of institutional corruption, is there any doubt why overdevelopment and horrendous traffic have replaced good planning in Irvine?

What can you do about it? Vote Nov. 6th. And be sure to encourage your friends and neighbors to vote, too! ICNV



Coming Soon: 60,000 - 100,000 More Residents!






